Now Remodeled!

The Station 66 upgrade was Tualatin Valley Fire & Rescue's first capital construction project funded by a \$77.5 million bond approved by voters in November 2006. It was completed in December 2007.

The station was seismically upgraded, ensuring emergency response following a major earthquake and compliance with state law and local building codes. The upgrade also provided Americans with Disability Act compliance and safety improvements, including an interior sprinkler system and monitored alarms. The project updated locker rooms and sleeping areas and added a physical fitness room. The upgrade added 2,915 square feet to the station to accommodate multiple crews and apparatus as demands for service increase.

To commemorate the project's completion, the District held an open house and rededication ceremony on Feb. 23, 2008. Neighbors were invited to tour the facility and meet with the Station 66 crew.

Location/Service Area

Station 66's first-response area includes both residential and multi-family occupancies as well as residential care facilities in South Beaverton and North Tigard.

Why upgrade the station?

Station 66 was built in 1974 and was TVF&R's smallest station. It had operational and safety concerns, and because of its small size could only accommodate a single engine and four-person crew.
