Tualatin Valley Fire & Rescue has purchased and deployed 24 units throughout TVF&R's service area.

Why did we need new apparatus?

TVF&R crews put nearly a million miles on the District's fleet annually while responding to emergencies and other service calls. Regular maintenance and timely replacement of apparatus are vital to the District's reliability and quick response times. The typical lifespan of emergency response apparatus is 15 years and/or approximately 150,000 miles.

What did the Capital Improvement Bond fund?

TVF&R's capital improvement bond purchased replacement apparatus over time, as existing front-line engines reached their lifespan threshold. The opening of Station 50 in Tigard and Station 70 in Raleigh Hills as well as the replacement of West Linn stations required the purchase of new apparatus. The bond also paid for a new ladder truck and a rescue vehicle in Sherwood.

New and replacement apparatus purchased over time as part of the bond included:

- Nine Engines
- Two Trucks
- Two Water Tenders
- Eight Transport Rescues
- One Heavy Rescue
- Two Tiller Trucks
